## BIOGRAPHICAL

Whilst the writer of this brief notice is not an admirer of those long obituaries which so often appear in the journals of the present day, and which, it is to be feared, too often ascribe to the departed, virtues for which they were not very remarkable while living, yet he thinks there are numerous occasions which demand from the living, tributes to the memory of the really virtuous dead; and it is to be hoped that all who know *Richard T. Anderson*, the eldest son of Capt. James Anderson, of Buckingham county, Virginia, who died on the 13th day of April last, in the 29th year of his age, will bear testimony to his great moral worth, his uniform christian deportment, and his gentlemanly bearing in society. When such a young man as *Richard T. Anderson* is removed from the circle in which he has been accustomed to move, fond relations and friends are not alone called upon to deplore his loss, but the community in which he lived, and society generally feel that such a dispensation of an all-wise Providence produces a vacuum which is not easily filled.

In early life Mr. Anderson made a profession of religion and whilst he did not attach himself to any particular branch of Christ's church, yet such was his humility, and such his christian walk and conversation, that none who knew him ever doubted the sincerity of his profession. "On earth, peace, good will toward men," seemed to be his motto during his brief career, and if he has left behind him a single individual who harbors the slightest enmity towards him, it is unknown to him who pens this imperfect tribute to his memory, although he enjoyed an intimate acquaintance with him from early childhood until the day of his death. Whilst his loss is generally deplored by all who knew him, none feel it so sensibly as his devoted father, whose declining years he cherished and honored by all that devotion to his interests and his comforts that should ever characterize such a son in his intercourse with such a father. May he take consolation in the reflection that his christian example and his parental admonitions were not vainly bestowed upon his noble-hearted boy, and in the peaceful assurance of being re-united to him in the abode of the blessed, "when life's dull vanities are o'er."

Departed this life, on the 10th inst., at his father's residence, in the county of Buckingham, Mr. *William R. Anderson*, in the 22d year of his age.

Brother Anderson was an interesting and lovely young man. The amiableness of his disposition, the urbanity of his manners, and his ardent love for his relatives and friends won the admiration and esteem of all who knew him. To his numerous natural virtues was added an enlightened, uncompromising and consistent piety. About two years ago he entered upon the ways of wisdom, and soon afterwards became a member of the M. E.

Church, in which he remained until his dissolution. As he had lived piously he died safely; and he bore his protracted and severe illness with great patience and resignation.

A few days before he fell asleep in the arms of Jesus, he spoke frequently of the nearness of the termination of all his troubles, and of the rest that remained for him beyond the grave, and he earnestly entreated his dear relatives to "be faithful until death," that they might be saved.

He gave the most indubitable evidence of his acceptance with God, and therefore his bereaved parents and other relatives do not weep as those without hope. He has gone to rejoin his sainted brother *Richard*, who died a few months since. And may the bereaved and overwhelmed parents be sustained by grace here, and finally meet their sons in glory.

## OBITUARIES.

Departed this life, on the 21st of June, 1887, PETER H. PATTERSON, at his home in Buckhannon county, Va., in the seventy-first year of his age.

Bro. Patterson was for many years a devout and consistent member of the Mulberry Grove Church. He was a man of strong native gifts, and was prominent and active in his church. He served his brethren as clerk and deacon, and discharged his duties with scrupulous fidelity. He was in former years superintendent of his Sunday school, and in that capacity he was conscientious and efficient. He reared an interesting family, and sought diligently to train his children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, and lived to see all of them united with the church of Christ. As a citizen he was upright in his bearing, neighborly in his spirit, and a lover of good men. She leaves, beside her husband and ten children, many relatives and friends to mourn her loss, but our loss is her eternal gain.

We tender our deepest sympathy to the bereaved family, and commend them to Him "Who doeth all things well," and may they recognize the hand of Providence and say, "Thy will be done." May the Lord bless and comfort them in their affliction, especially Mary, who was so attentive to her mother during her illness, and may He say to each and every one, when He calls for them, as He did to her: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joys of thy Lord."
