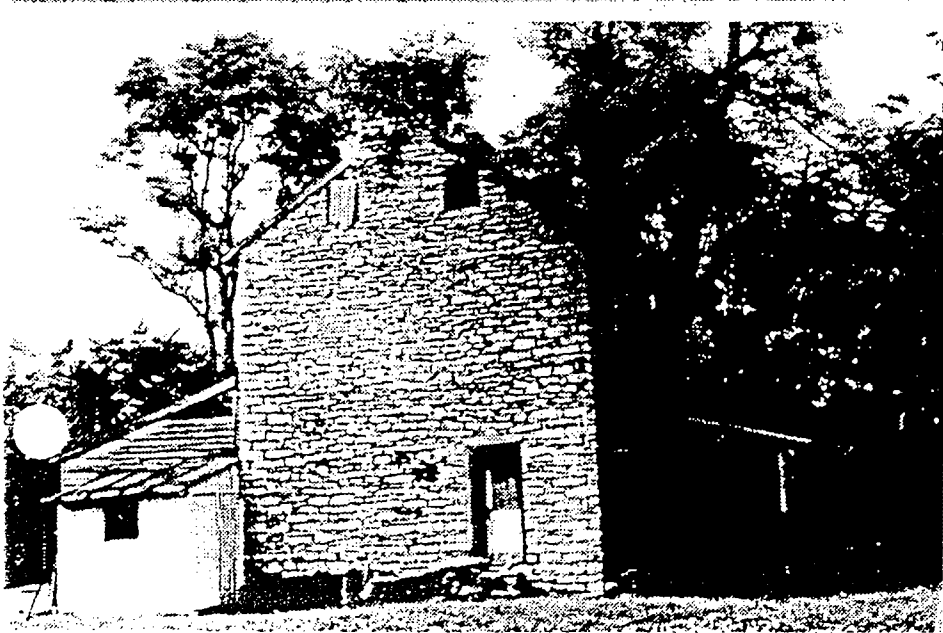

of his lifelong fight against slavery and for social equality. As a worker for the American Missionary Association, he founded antislavery churches in Lewis and Bracken counties with the help of his wife, Matilda Hamilton, whom he had married on September 16, 1844.

Fee's attacks on slavery, from the pulpit and in print, attracted the attention of emancipationist Cassius Marcellus Clay, who regarded Fee as a useful political ally. Clay invited the minister to southern Madison County, where Fee was to be pastor of several new free churches. In 1854 Fee settled in Berea on ten acres of land that Clay gave him. Fee attracted many followers in his new ministry. But in 1856 his alliance with Clay was shattered when the two men, speaking at a Fourth of July Republican rally, disagreed publicly on the Fugitive Slave Law. Without Clay's protection, Fee was threatened by local mobs but continued to preach his "incendiary" views. By 1859 Fee proposed an abolitionist colony in Berea with a coeducational, integrated college.

John Brown's raid on Harper's Ferry frightened slaveholders all over the South, not least in Madison County, Kentucky, where, in December 1859, sixty planters banded together to drive Fee and his workers from the state. Although the Bereans appealed to Gov. Beriah Magoffin (1859-62), they were banished. Fee and his family settled near Cincinnati, but throughout the war he repeatedly tried to return to his native state. On several occasions he was mobbed by irate citizens—even in his hometown—and threatened with death if he continued his work. Suffering from ill health and despondent at the loss of his youngest child, who had died as a result of exposure during their exit from Kentucky, Fee persevered, holding immediate emancipation meetings and raising funds to purchase land for the college in Berea, even though his return to Kentucky was uncertain.

In 1864 Fee found a new missionary field at Camp Nelson, Kentucky's foremost military camp for black soldiers. Camp Nelson also attracted thousands of black women and children fleeing from slavery. Fee set up schools, founded a church, and administered a refugee camp for the dependents of black soldiers. Torn between his work at Camp Nelson and his mission at Berea, Fee finally opted for the latter, but he invited many people from Camp Nelson to settle in Berea, promising they could purchase land there. Again he proposed a school where men and women, black and white, could study together as equals. This plan was realized in Berea by 1866; by 1869 the new school became Berea College, and the town of Berea, colonized as part of Fee's total plan for integrated education in an interracial society, burgeoned. Throughout the 1860s, Fee labored for recognition of black equality, speaking in favor of black suffrage and advocating civil rights legislation. In Berea, Fee initiated a program of "interspersion," in which blacks and whites bought farm land and town lots in the same neighborhoods.

In his old age Fee's influence waned. Some of his followers repudiated his strict views on baptism by immersion and many more opposed his radical position on social equality, an anathema in America's Jim Crow era. Although Berea College flourished, the policies Fee had implemented were gradually phased out: During his presidency, beginning in 1892, William G. Frost completely revised the mission of Berea College. Nevertheless, Fee fought for social equality in Berea and across the nation until his death on January 11, 1901. He was buried in the Berea Cemetery.

FERGUSON, CHAMP. Champ Ferguson, Civil War guerrilla, was born on a branch of Spring Creek near Albany, Clinton County, Kentucky, on November 29, 1821. He was the eldest of ten children and grew up along the Kentucky-Tennessee border in the Cumberland Mountains. In 1843 Ferguson married a woman named Ann, who died a few years later. In 1848 he married Martha Owens, also a native of Clinton County, and they had a daughter, Ann, in 1849.

Caught up in the fluid violence of the border region during the Civil War, Ferguson excelled as a guerrilla in the Kentucky-Tennessee area. Occasionally claiming respectability by riding with Gen. John Hunt Morgan's Confederate raiders, Ferguson spent most of the war commanding, with the self-commissioned rank of captain, an independent guerrilla company. He was declared an outlaw by the Federal authorities in Kentucky and threatened with summary execution if captured. Ferguson survived the war and returned to his prewar home in White County, Tennessee. Many other guerrillas were given amnesty, but Ferguson was arrested on May 26, 1865, and charged with fifty-three counts of murder before a military court in Nashville. The trial lasted from July to October 1865 and was reported daily in the Nashville newspapers. Ferguson was found guilty and on October 10, 1865, he was sentenced to be hanged. The sentence was carried out on October 20, and his body was turned over to his wife and daughter. Ferguson's last request was to be buried at his home in White County on a branch of Calfkiller Creek near Sparta, Tennessee.

FERGUSON, RICHARD BABINGTON. Richard Babington Ferguson, an early figure in medicine in Louisville, was born in 1769, in Londonderry, Ireland. When he arrived in Louisville in 1802, Ferguson intended to continue down the river to New Orleans but, at the urging of a friend and the flip of a coin, decided to remain in Louisville. There he married Elizabeth Aylett Booth on February 3, 1803. They had seven children.

In 1809 Ferguson, a practicing physician, assisted Drs. William Galt and John Collins in amputating

The name Ferguson or Fergusson means simply son of Fergus, an ancient Scottish name, one of the most eminent in Scotland. The names Fergus and Ferguson down to two centuries ago were used interchangeably in some families. The name is sometimes derived from faargachur meaning a fiery or wrathful disposition. According to Logan it is a personal application implying a hero. This name says that author, may vie with any in point of antiquity and honor, for who has not heard of the renowned Fergus, the founder of Scotland's monarchy.

Among fixed traditions handed down from generation to generation by certain related but widely separated families in America of the name of Ferguson, it is held that the name and family is descended from the royal house of Scotland, through Fergus, first King of Scotland, and that many of the family were of the haughty aristocracy, and whether in Europe or America, the family has always produced its quota of distinguished citizens.

ABRAHAM FERGUSON

Revolutionary Soldier and Early Settler

in Fayette County, Kentucky

Abraham Ferguson was the son of John Ferguson, a native of Scotland, who immigrated to Virginia. Abraham was a native of Fauquier county, Virginia and removed to Fayette county, Kentucky at an early date settling upon land he had obtained from the government by virtue of his service in the Revolutionary War. See Footnotes hereafter.

Indians were plentiful in those days and while working on his land his gun was his constant companion for self

and testament, revoking all those heretofore made.

Item 1—I make and bequeath to the surviving heirs of my daughter Polly Dudley deceased Four Thousand dollars being in addition to what I have already given her in her life time.

Item 2—I give and bequeath unto my son John B. Ferguson, Five Thousand dollars in currency, also six negroes.

Item 3—I give and bequeath unto my daughter Nancy Ware, Five Thousand dollars in currency, likewise six negroes, this in addition to what I have already given her.

Item 4—I give and bequeath unto my son Clifton R. Ferguson, three negroes, also three shares in Northern Bank, this in addition to what I have already given him.

Item 5—I give and bequeath unto my son Abraham L. Ferguson all my tract and parcel of land, situated, lying and being in the county of Fayette and lying on the waters of David's Fork, on which I now reside. My son is to pay unto my son John B. Ferguson, Five Thousand dollars in currency, and unto my daughter, Nancy Ware, Five Thousand dollars in currency. I give and bequeath unto my son Abraham L. Ferguson, Five Thousand dollars, also six negroes, in addition to what I have already given him.

Item 6—My will and desire is that the remainder of my estate, real, personal and mixed I wish to be sold and the proceeds divided among my four surviving children.

Lastly, I constitute and appoint my sons Clifton R. Ferguson and Abraham L. Ferguson executors to this my last will and testament, and having confidence in my executors do not require them to give surety.

In Fayette county, Ky., Co. Ct. Book D, p. 44, Sept. 1802 one Josiah Ferguson is shown to have had son, John. The relationship, if any, to Abraham Ferguson is unknown.

In looking over this Ferguson record, I realize it is most incomplete, and I have just barely "scratched the surface" of Abraham's line, for with seven children and more than forty grand-children, widely scattered, it would be almost impossible to trace all to the present generation. It might be said of him as of Abraham of old that his seed was multiplied until it was "as numerous as the stars of the heavens, and as the sand upon the sea-shore."

ANCESTRY OF MARY CRAWFORD.

Mother of Mary Rodes, Grandmother of Nancy Smith, Wife of Abraham Ferguson

1—John Crawford, a Scotchman, emigrated to Virginia about the middle of the sixteenth century. He was the youngest son of the Earl of Crawford. John lost his life in the Indian campaign of Bacon's Rebellion.

It is highly probable the John Ferguson father of Abraham Ferguson county.

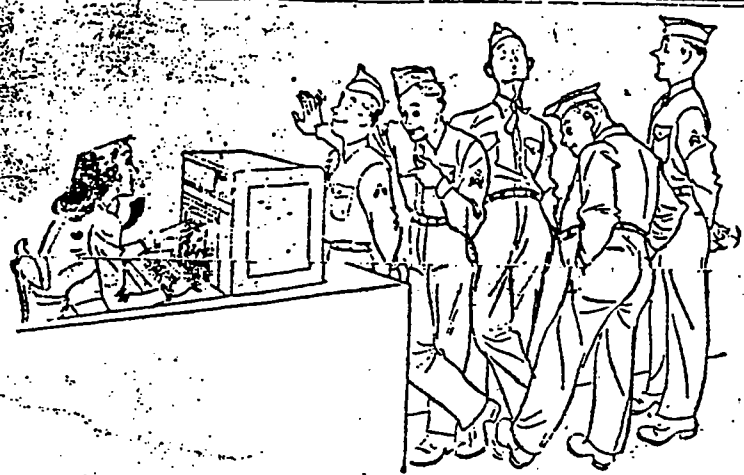

NASA retiree talks of exciting times, enjoys teaching

Astronauts have many areas of concern before heading into space; the conditions need to be perfect. It takes many people from all over the country specializing in different fields for a space flight to run smoothly.

Dr. Kel Ferguson, part-time biology instructor at UT Tyler, worked at the Johnson Space Center for 20 years helping the space flights run their course.

"It was an exciting career. I wouldn't change it for the world," he said.

Ferguson grew up in Nacogdoches and received his bachelor's degree from Stephen F. Austin State University. He received his master's degree from North Texas University.

After receiving a Ph.D. in preventive medicine and environmental health from the University of Iowa, Ferguson began working at NASA in 1967.

"I was ready to get back to Texas, that was probably why I was so interested in NASA," he said.

Ferguson said the most exciting time of his life was the Summer of 1969.

"I was a part of the team of the first men landing on the moon." The Apollo 11 flight

crew were Neil Armstrong, Mike Collins and Buzz Aldrin.

"I was a part of a small group that woke them up in the morning for their last physical before they went up. I was there when they got back to collect lunar soil samples. That was an exciting

time."

According to Ferguson, the movie *Apollo 13* was very accurate. A son of one of the flight controllers produced the movie.

In the movie, one of the three original crew members, Ken Mattingly, was not able to take the flight after being exposed to the German measles. Ferguson took blood samples from him which showed he had no immunity for

the measles.

"We couldn't take the chance. You don't risk others' lives and the mission," he said. Ferguson also said that even though they did not make it to the moon, Mattingly was upset that he was not a part of the flight. The Apollo 13 flight had several problems.

"We were extremely anxious and fearful for their safety. Everyone was doing their best to make sure they got back," Ferguson said.

The mission control center has thousands of people in different rooms that are ready to give information and help solve problems as they arise. Each person in the mission control room monitors a different area of the ship and each feeds their information to the mission control director.

"The team effort is what saved them. We had all these problem solvers ready to give possible solutions like taking all the carbon dioxide from the air of the compartment."

At age 31, Ferguson joined NASA. His first assignment was the development of a toxicology laboratory. They had one year to build a lab, hire people and build protocols for Apollo 11.

"I was shocked. It was terrible; we worked day and night. Luckily the mission was delayed and we got two years," Ferguson said.

He was also told that he was in charge of microanalysis of lunar soil and to support the quarantine of astronauts before their space flight.

The first in-flight illness that Ferguson came in contact with was on the Apollo 9. The crew members had

upper respiratory infections which Ferguson said endangered their lives.

"The pressure built up and caused them severe pain. They couldn't even wear their helmets," he said. The astronauts have to be monitored before, during and after flights. The flight crew health stabilization program keeps astronauts in isolation. NASA provides on-site housing for the crew members and restricts their travel and visitors.

Ferguson became the Deputy Chief of the Medical Operations branch in 1982 and remained the chief until he retired in 1987.

As the chief, he was in charge of the medical responsibilities for the flight crew members and their families by providing The Flight Medicine Clinic. The Occupational Medicine Clinic served all the workers at the Johnson Space Center.

He also was in charge of monitoring the space center and environmental labs. He gave emergency medical coverage for flights and was involved in operational research.

Ferguson says the most traumatic time of his career was the loss of the Challenger.

"Being a part of the Challenger team was very dramatic and devastating; it was hopelessly quiet. Everybody was trying to gather their thoughts. There wasn't anything anybody could do. It was total destruction. There would be no recovery. Not too much was done the rest of that day," he said.

Ferguson said working at NASA was

like working in a pressure cooker. He said they would work day and night until the job was done.

"When you see the same problems arise on different flights, you realize there are more relaxing times and you take retirement," he said.

After retiring in 1987, Ferguson did consulting work for NASA for three years during the development of the space station. His work consisted of environmental monitoring, helping with medical labs and their functions and aiding in microbiological problems.

After the consulting work, Ferguson and his wife moved to a farm in Ruisk. They stored everything there and began traveling.

"I dreamed of traveling like this all my life," he said. They bought a motor home and toured the states. They also spent two and a half months in Alaska and toured Europe.

About four years ago Ferguson moved to Tyler and talked to Dr. James Stewart and Dr. Don Killebrew about teaching part-time at UTT. He says turning to teaching was natural for him because he has fond memories of teaching and of being in school himself.

Ferguson said he thought of teaching when he received his Ph.D. He taught in public schools and taught a freshman zoology and botany class at North Texas while he was a graduate student.

Ferguson teaches Environment and Man which is a biology class for non-majors. This class reviews fundamental principles of the biological and physical sciences. Ferguson says with that foundation the class reviews current environmental problems and discusses possible sustainable solutions.

"I thoroughly enjoy the contact with the students. They keep my mind active."

(William and Mary Quarterly, Volume 5, page 4.)

"William Timson (Samuel, Samuel) Will dated November 1756, proved January 17, 1757, married Elizabeth who married 2nd. John Ferguson."

Spottsylvania Record (Crozier), page 231—

"February 2nd, 1746, John Ferguson is mentioned in Fauquier County". In the army before the battle of "The meadows" according to returns made at Willis Creek, July 9, 1754, I find the name of John Ferguson. "This return is recorded in Washington's own handwriting"—

Abraham Ferguson served two years in the Revolution, and was in the battles of Trenton, Germantown and Brandywine.

From Douglas Register:

"Nancy Smith and Abraham Ferguson married November the 8th, 1788."

From Abraham Ferguson's Bible, now the property of Mrs. Mildred Carter Watkins. We feel sure that some of the records in this Bible were written by Abraham Ferguson himself. "Abraham Ferguson, born May 3rd, 1761 died July 2nd, 1840."

"Nancy Smith, born June 9th, 1764, and died April 1st, 1837, about three or four minutes after 10 o'clock at night." Their children were:

- (1) "Polly, born December 1st, 1782, married James Dudley, son of Ambrose and Ann Parker Dudley. She died March 28, 1833. She was baptized March 22nd, 1801."
- (2) "Betty, born March 18th, 1784. Died November 30th, 1805."
- (3) "John B. born May 11th, 1787, died January 8th, 1840. Was a soldier the War of 1812. He married Mildred Marshall Wright."
- (4) "Nancy b. June 6, 1790. Married George Ware. She died September 14th, 1849. George Ware died July 28, 1849." These were the parents of Abraham Ware.
- (5) "William Marshall, born February 4th, 1793. Married Lucy Woodson Chiles. Died August 8th, 1833."
- (6) "Clifton, born January 20th, 1795, was baptized in 1833 and died January 16, 1849."
- (7) "Abraham, Jr., born September 27, 1803, died May 29, 1854."

From Perrin's History of Bourbon, Scott, Harrison and Nicholas Counties I copied the following:

"E. S. Dudley was a grandson of Abraham Ferguson. His mother died May 22, 1823 (the Bible has it March 28, 1833). E. S. Dudley was born January 28, 1811. He married Henrietta Clay. His father was born May 12, 1777 and died June 16, 1870.

"Abraham L. Ferguson married Mary K. Matson. She was b. February 9, 1810, and d. August 2, 1878. She was a daughter of Thomas and Rebecca (Spears) Matson. Their children were: Lewis, Noah, Robert, Earl, James W., Mary Eliza, wife of James H. Campbell. James W. married Martha A. Hume, daughter of William Patton Hume. She was born near Clintonville May 7, 1830, and married August 5th, 1856. Abraham L. Ferguson died August 1st, 1854." (The Bible has it May 28.) Their children were William P., Abraham L., Maggie B., Robert H., Lucy E., Volney W., Matilda R. and James H. The home built by Abraham L. Ferguson is now owned by Mrs. Charles Ashbury.

"... Almost in the Heart of Douglass"

An interview with John Ferguson
by Deborah Carroll

John Ferguson, seventy-four years of age, lives alone in an ancient sycamore-shaded frame house on Highway 21 just east of Douglass stores, or as he states, "Just almost in the heart of Douglass." He has lived in the Douglass vicinity all of his life, and when he was approached by me for Chinquapin, he showed that he was really excited at the prospect of having his story told.

"My daddy moved to Douglass from Kentucky in 1890," he said. "Ma and daddy got married in 1900. My ma was raised at the dairy farm where Jack Fitzgerald now lives. They called it old Thomas place.

"I was born on the old Thomas place in 1902. In 1912 we moved up here to where I live now.

"I went to school here in Douglass in 1909 to 1920. In school I was always with the other brothers. I graduated from Douglass in 1920.

"The Douglass school house was made out of wood--two story. I remember it used to be cold, and there were no windows. We had a ol' wooden stove to get warm by. Wood had to be brought in and thrown in a big wood box in the corner. The stoves had to be built up and kept a' goin' strong all day to keep us all from freezing."

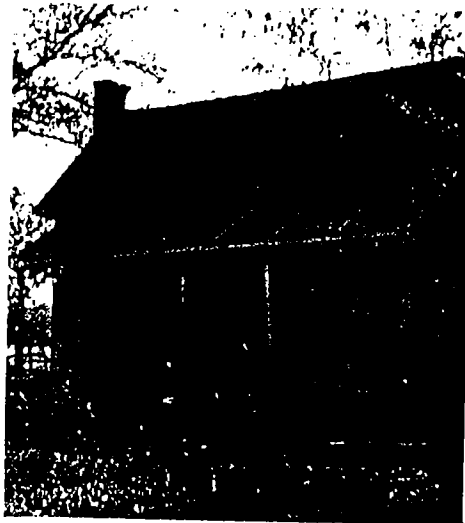
Mr. Ferguson smiled, and he continued, "When I was going to school, I fancied a girl named Davis. She was about the prettiest girl I ever did

"My daddy was the board of Douglass school for seventeen years.

"As I was going to school, I still remember, over near the school house, there was two squares. Back in them days they had square dancing clubs, too. 'Yonder a ways' (and he makes an indefinite gesture toward distant trees.) "they made white lightning. Boy! That lightning was strong."

I looked around the Ferguson house, and noticed several interesting pieces of furniture and other items that looked like antiques to me. I asked him about them.

"See that there pulley a hangin' on the ceiling; that was even before we moved here. When I draw water up through the well, the pulley still sounds the same way it did back when I was a youngster.



Mr. Ferguson's home is located on Highway 21 not far from the stores and post office in the Douglass community.

"Now, this here Singer (He indicates a foot-pedal operating sewing machine), my ma used to sew our school clothes with. This dresser here. My ma had this in her bedroom. (The dresser looked colonial style. The paint was all off it, and the glass on the mirror was not clear, but it was easy to see the beauty of the piece of old furniture.)

My attention was then called to the fireplace. It was beautiful. The mantle and outer walls were made of the same sort of wood, very well preserved. The paint was in fairly good condition. There were only a few scratches. The strangest, oddest thing I saw was a live chicken that was sitting on a nest in the fireplace, laying an egg.

Mr. Ferguson continued: "My daddy, me, and my youngest brother, who was born in 1913, plowed this land with oxen. Yonder there was a lake filled with water all year round. Now it's dried up there. My daddy raised cotton in the fields back out there." He pointed toward the south of the house, and then indicating the giant, white-trunked trees in the year, he said "My sister and I planted them sycamore trees yonder in 1916 or 1917--one or the other.

"My ma and us went to church once a month, and that was called the union meetin'. The old church that was next to the school was there even before we moved here. My daddy helped build the First Baptist Church." This church is located on the side of Highway 21 opposite Mr. Ferguson's house, a little toward the west.

"In 1912, we got a Ford Model T. I remember the first car that came out. My daddy drove it through here and scared the chickens and cows plum gone. The noise was something terrible.

Some other interesting facts Mr. John told me about are listed here:

"My family was always Democrat. I was twenty-one when I first voted."

"The first cow my daddy bought was twelve dollars. We named it 'Yellow Rose' because of the breed. My daddy had the same breed, Yellow Rose, here since we was young children. We used to buy our cattle for four dollars, or so."

"One of the games we used to play was cannon-ball. We'd take a ball in one of our stockings, and throw it."

"I remember when we had the influenza flu. Boy! A lot of people sure died from it. When they did get over it after a week, they died of a weak heart. 1918, I remember when we had the whooping cough. It was during World War I; that's when most of our soldiers died."

It was a pleasure for both Mr. Ferguson and for me to talk together. He is an interesting person with a positive outlook on life. I plan to visit with him again soon.

Douglass Man Second Traffic Fatality Of '56

William C. Ferguson, 80, Dies From Wreck Injuries

Nacogdoches County's second traffic fatality of the year occurred Thursday afternoon in the death of William C. Ferguson, 80, of Douglass, who was injured in a pick-up truck wreck Monday afternoon, June 11.

Mr. Ferguson died in City Memorial Hospital Thursday afternoon, June 14, at 1:05 o'clock of spinal injuries suffered Monday afternoon at 3:45 o'clock in a crash 1.6 miles east of Douglass on State Highway 21.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the First Baptist church in Douglass with the Rev. J. E. Johnson of Palestine and the Rev. C. T. McGuire and the Rev. W. R. Stowell of Douglass officiating.

Interment was in the Douglass cemetery.

Mr. Ferguson was riding in a pick-up truck driven by Willie Griffin of Douglass at the time of the crash. The men were related.

Herman Hearne, highway patrolman who investigated, said that the pavement was slick from rain at the time of the wreck and that evidently the brakes on one side of the pick-up were wet. Mr. Griffin told Mr. Hearne that he applied the brakes, the pick-up swung to one side, overturned and took a three-quarter mile into a tree. Mr. Ferguson was carried to the hospital by Bailey Metcalf ambulance.

Born July 22, 1875, in New Castle, Ky., Mr. Ferguson had lived in Douglass since early life. He was married first to Caroline Thomas and later to Ethyl Wilson who survives him. A farmer and stockman, Mr. Ferguson was self-employed. He was a senior deacon in the First Baptist church in Douglass.

Clyde Partin was in charge of the song service at the funeral rites and Mrs. Pete McGuire was at the organ.

Survivors are his wife, Mr. Ethyl Ferguson, one daughter, Mrs. Mary Barr of Center, four sons, Earl Ferguson of Douglass, W. and M. B. Ferguson of Port Arthur, and J. D. Ferguson of Odessa, and another son, Ferguson of Lomax, Okla., six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

There also survive three step-daughters, Mrs. Edith Meigs of Odessa, Mrs. Vera Rector of Indiana, and Miss Dora Wilson of Douglass, five step-sons, B. N. and G. W. Wilson of Nacogdoches, Homer Wilson of Nat. R., F. Wilson of Mission, and J. M. Wilson of Vincent, thirteen step-grandchildren, and one step-great-grandchild.

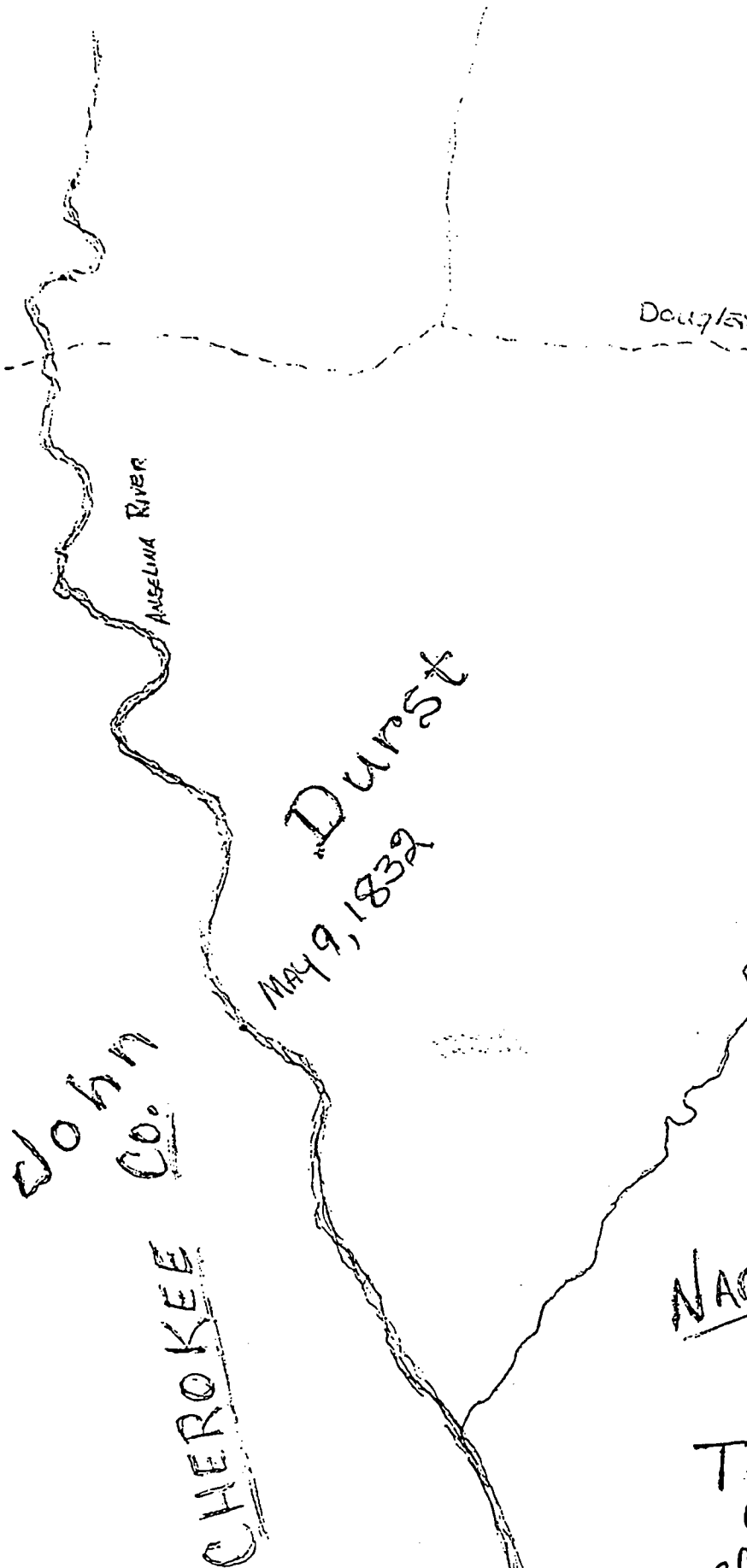

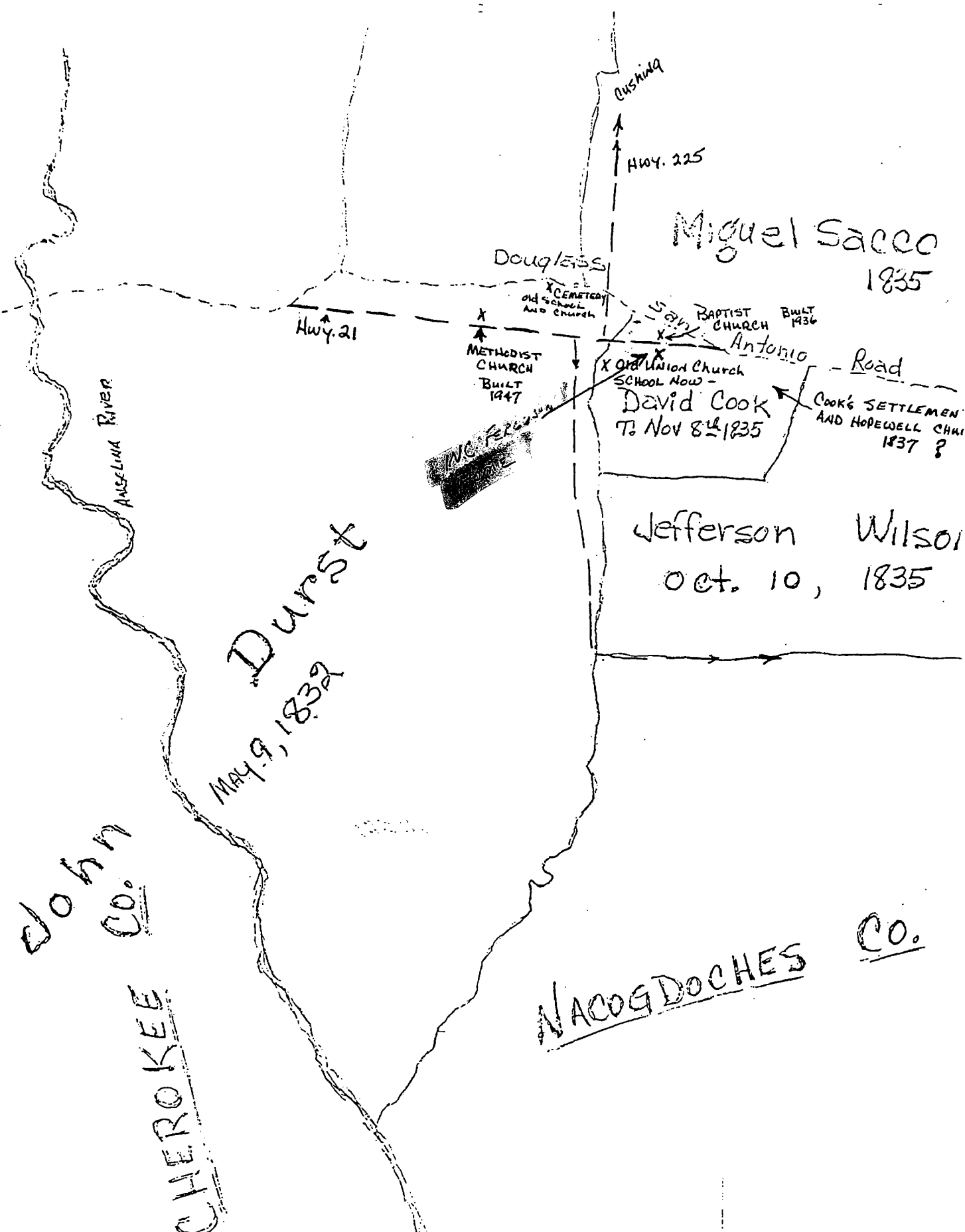

THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH
of Douglass, Texas 1878-1969

This brief history of Douglass, Texas and the Douglass Baptist Church is not meant to be all inclusive. These selected items are from the records that are available. The earliest written record of the Church is 1908. The records of the Church were burned in a fire at the home of the Church Clerk, Mrs. Nora King in December 1906.

There was a Baptist witness in Douglass even before the town was called Douglass. The following information is found in Texas Baptist by B.H. Carroll (1843-1914) on page 48.

"Sat. Sep. 30, 1837 - on the 17th Constituted a Church on the East side of the Angeleney. Deacon Wm. Sparks in charge Daniel Parker Moderator. The Church is located in Brother Cook's settlement with 8 members."

B.H. Carroll goes on to say the Church may have been called Hopewell at that time. Cook's settlement was located in the Cook land grant which is in the Douglass area. This information was from Elder Daniel Parker's diary. He moved from Illinois to Texas and settled at Elkhart, Texas. He is said to be the first Baptist pastor in Texas. He was a Primitive Baptist, and he helped start over 20 Baptist Churches in East Texas.

The history of the town itself is quite interesting. The following information was secured from the Stephen F. Austin State University East Texas Section. Grateful acknowledgment is given to the Library for the use of old letters and records.

Douglass, in western Nacogdoches County fourteen miles west of Nacogdoches, was laid out in 1836 by Michael Costley on an eight-hundred-acre tract of land purchased from John Durst.

Douglass was in existence before Texas became independent of Mexico. Some writers place the founding date as far back as 1829.

The first mercantile establishment was that of Costley and Ables. The town is named for Kelsey H. Douglass, who was then a merchant in Nacogdoches. He represented Nacogdoches County in the Second Congress and was in command at the battle of the Neches. The town was the site of a stagecoach inn on the Old San Antonio Road. It was torn down several years back, and the home of E.V. Rector is built out of the material.

General Kelsey Douglass was commander-in-chief of the forces that drove the Cherokee Indians out of East Texas in 1839. It is reported that General Sam Houston named Douglass in honor of General Douglass. In 1840 General Douglass owned over 41,500 acres of land, 6 slaves, and one silver watch, according to the tax records for that year. He had several business interests in town, but his large general store which set on the square burned in 1840 along with several other stores. General Kelsey Douglass died in 1840 and is buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in Nacogdoches.

Douglass was laid out in a square because it was anticipated that it would soon become a large town. There were several business places all around the square. The main purpose of the founding of Douglass was as a stage stop for the Butterfield Stage Coach Line. The stage coach inn, a two-story building stood in Douglass until a few years ago. There were two hotels, a jail, two saloons, a drug store, several doctors practiced in Douglass, as many as four or five were here at one time, there was a blacksmith shop, a hardware store, a grocery store, a cotton gin, where the Eugene Rector home is now, a general store, and a shoe tannery, located just West of the Water Works. There was also a grist mill, a saw mill, a brick kiln, which was located on what was called "Brick Yard Branch" which is close to the Bill Kelley place, a post office, and other small business places made up Douglass.

Two men were hung in Douglass, one for killing the postmaster, Joe Looney, by cutting his throat, and the other for assaulting a woman. Saturdays the women and children had to stay home because the town was so wild.

It is known that Sam Houston once camped his troops in Douglass during the war for independence.

Richard W. Holtom wrote in 1880:

"The people of Douglass are generally of a quite moral turn, mostly farmers. There are four mercantile houses in town carrying mixed stocks of dry goods, groceries, and general merchandise. There are some places where ardent spirits are sold, one drug store, other small business, a church, school, and lodge hall. The town has two physicians. Justice court is held here once a month."

One of the early doctors in Douglass was Dr. Wm. Hill Campbell. Dr. Campbell came to Douglass in 1879. His parents came from Scotland and settled at Larissa, Texas (outside Jacksonville, Texas, now nonexistent). There he graduated from

Larissa College. After his medical training he was a junior partner with Dr. R.B. Bone (one of the early doctors of the Nan Travis Hospital in Jacksonville). Dr. Campbell's wife was Miss Lilula Washburn who was the daughter of Dr. John Washburn D.D. He was the founder of Ewing College, a Baptist school in Ewing, Ill. She was a graduate of this college. When the Campbell's moved to Douglass it was a thriving community. Five children were born to them: William Bone, Irene, Fannie, Myrtle, and Byron. Irene is buried in Douglass. He was a faithful doctor for a large area. He traveled by horseback to visit the sick. Once in an ice storm he had to leave his horse and go on foot. He then had to crawl up a hill to see "Uncle" Lawson Whitaker who was very ill. When he got inside his beard was frozen.

The preachers of the three denominations represented in Douglass were the Presbyterian, Methodist, and Baptist. They were circuit riding preachers, and many would stay the weekend in Doctor Campbell's home. He was a Methodist, and Mrs. Campbell was a Baptist.

Dr. Campbell was a close friend of Brother George W.C. Self, the Presbyterian Minister. Bro. Self was famous for his long prayers. Dr. Campbell would tease him about his long praying. He said once that he fell asleep during Bro. Self's prayer and when everyone moved about he thought the service was over so he got his hat and got up to leave. Bro. Self married most of the couples in that day. He married Mr. Bob King and Kitty Coon. He never married himself, he remained single all his life.

Mrs. Campbell was loved by all the people from Douglass, Eden, Nat, Friendship, and all over. She and Mrs. Bob Murphey were the two main ones who sat up with the sick. Mrs. Campbell taught music through the years.

Dr. Campbell was a man of humor, his idea was, "a merry heart doeth good like a medicine". Mr. V.E. Middlebrook, the founder of a boarding school in Douglass, Dr. Campbell, Mr. R.W. Murphey, Willie Watkins, and others participated in what was called "The Lyceum" which provided entertainment for the people.

In 1900 Dr. Campbell moved his family to Nacogdoches where they would have more educational advantages. Dr. R.A. Wilson bought the home and practice in Douglass.

Dr. Wilson was in practice for many years in Douglass. His office burned when the town burned down. Dr. Wilson moved his practice to Wildhurst, near Forest, Texas to help the saw mill. Dr. Whitaker was in practice for several years in the 1800's. Miss Kitty Finley Married Dr. Whitaker and after his death in the late 1800's she married Dr. W.I. Coon. They had one daughter, Kitty Coon

born in 1891. Dr. W.I. Coon died in 1893. He also owned a store in Douglass. There have been several doctors that had their practice in Douglass over the years. When Dr. Wilson moved to Wildhurst, Dr. George Perry Campbell (no relation to the first Dr. Campbell) practiced till 1923. After Dr. Campbell moved to Nacogdoches Dr. Wilson returned to Douglass from around Austin, and he was the last doctor in Douglass.

The father of Dr. George Perry Campbell was William Jefferson Campbell who came to Texas from Tennessee. He operated a wagon line from Douglass to Shreveport, Louisiana. His home was up on the "Mountain" near Nat, Texas. On January 1, 1880 he married Virginia "Jinnie" Perry, a school teacher at Douglass. They moved to Douglass. He ran for sheriff of Nacogdoches County and won in 1898.

The two political parties then were the Democrats and the Populist. Spradley of the Populist Party won in the 1902 election. In Douglass there were two schools, the Democrat and the Populist. The Populist school was where "Cowboy" Webster's home is now, and the Democrat Independent School was located in Douglass.

On November 4, 1902 W.J. Campbell wrote a petition in the newspaper, "The Plane Dealer" of Nacogdoches about how lax the law had become. He mentioned that Rev. Baucom's horse had been stolen, and the thief had not been caught. Bro. Baucom had preached several times at the Douglass Baptist Church in 1891-92.

In 1907, Mr. Wm. J. Campbell started building on the Campbell home which still stands today. Mrs. Nora King's home had burned Christmas of 1906, and O.F. Baxter, who was her half-brother, ask permission to build Mrs. Nora's house first. He stopped work on the Campbell home and built the home which is Mrs. Verline Wisener's home place now.

Dr. George Perry Campbell was born in 1888, in Douglass. His parents, Wm. J. Campbell and Virginia Perry Campbell, had six children. Two died when they were young. The children were: Minnie (died at 18 months), Berta, Beatrice, George Perry, and Tessie. Dr. Campbell received his education at Galveston, John Sealy Medical College. He ranked 3rd in his graduating class. Dr. Campbell came to Douglass in 1912. In June, 1913, he married Mattie Davis. Mattie had married Ed King on December 1, 1909, but he was killed when a horse fell on him in early, 1910, only two months and nine days after his marriage.

Dr. Campbell had his office in the drug store which was owned by his brother-in-law, Charlie B. Watkins. Dr. Campbell left Douglass in 1923 and moved to Nacogdoches. He, like so many overworked doctors of his day, died young. He died May 16, 1934, at the age of 46.

John Calhoun Barnett was an early settler in the Douglass area. He was a school teacher, book salesman, and a Presbyterian preacher. It is believed that he was the first Presbyterian ordained in Texas. He was ordained in 1839.

His old diary dates back to 1856 through 1858. Some interesting notes in his diary include where he preached and his text. He preached at Friendship, Douglass, Mt. Carmel, Rock Spring, Carrisso, Lebanon, Mt. Pleasant, New Hope, Pine Grove, Pleasant Hill, Lasting Hope, Pine Grove, Henderson, Mt. Interprise, Shiloh, and Mt. Vernon. He kept a list of books he sold in different places. He sold books for the Texas Presbyterian Book Concern. There is a listing where A.H. Watkins bought some books from him.

J.C. Barnett was also the agent of the Texas Presbyterian Board of Missions. He was paid seventy-five dollars for his services as a missionary September 4, 1857. There are several listings where he spent the night at Larrisa, Texas. His expenses were: dinner 25¢, toll 10¢, all night lodging \$1.00, livery stable \$3.50. In his diary he mentioned Samuel Barnett, Wm. Stedman, J.C. Cravon, R.D. Barnett, Y.H. Hamilton, B. Hardiman, and W.E. Lambert.

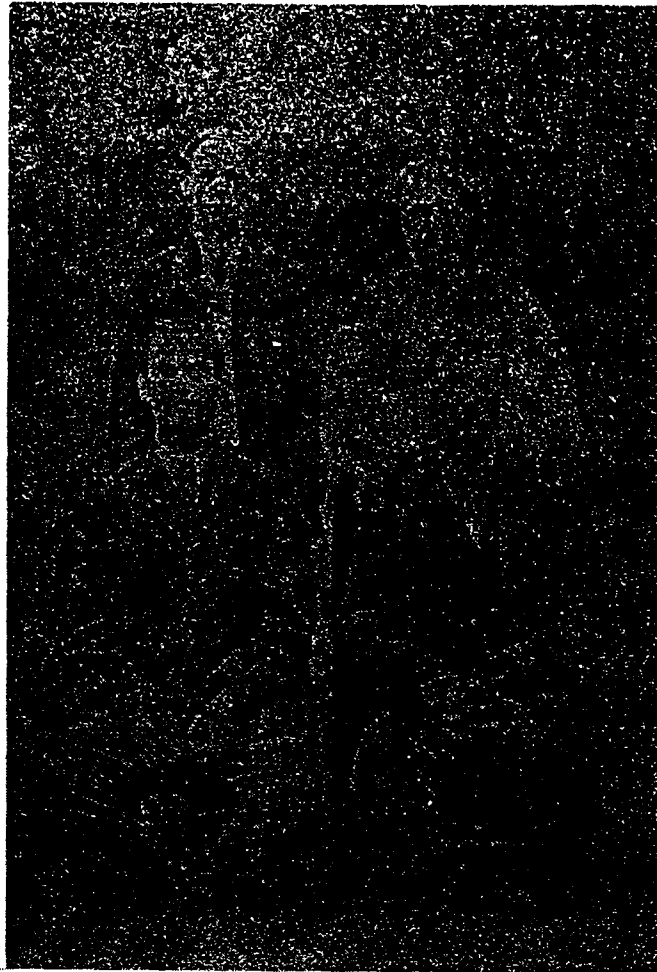
Amanda Ables and her brother James Ables came to Douglass before 1840 from Tennessee. James Ables and Thomas Calvin Spencer were partners in a teamster business. They drove wagons to New Orleans and back carrying supplies. Thomas Calvin Spencer and Amanda Ables were married August 4, 1842. He died in 1859. Amanda Spencer had three children: Thomas Calvin, George, and Mary Elizibeth. Mrs. Spencer owned several slaves. They were freed in 1865. The year they married the Spencers received a land grant near Nat, Texas. Thomas Calvin Spencer was the Justice of the Peace in Douglass from 1904 to 1908. He was a member of the Eden Baptist Church and the Douglass Baptist Church. His daughter was the post-mistress in Douglass several years. Her name was Mandy Spencer.

The Neel family is an old family in Douglass. This picture shows Tom Neel Jr. and Tom Sr. setting down and Cal Neel and Texana Warren Neel standing. They were all good singers. Tom Sr. and Cal taught music. Tom Sr. was known as a very religious man and a great sacred harp singer. He was elected constable of Douglass in the late 1800's and early 1900's. He was a tall dignified man. He was quite a sight as he would ride out of town after some law breaker on a little mule with his long legs almost touching the ground.

W.J. "Bill" Clevenger was another of the old settlers in Douglass. He owned the gin in Douglass and later one in Nacogdoches.

The following information was obtained from a copy of "Texas Baptist Statistics 1895" by James Milton Carroll.

The preachers who had preached or pastored in Douglass were listed in this book. They were pastoring several other places in 1894. S.A. Acrey was pastoring in Bullard at Salem Baptist Church. He lived in Alto. W.W. Albritton also lived in Alto. He pastored at New Hope. L.A. Bagley lived in Rusk, but got his mail in Douglass and pastored at Pleasant Grove and at Eden. Many of these men pastored two, three, and even four churches at one time. E.D. Blankenship pastored Bethany Baptist Church at Linn Flat. He lived at Chireno. J.F. Baucom was the pastor of Cold Springs Baptist Church near Garrison. He lived at Linn Flat.

THE BAPTIST INSTITUTE AT RUSK

The East Texas Baptist Institute at Rusk, Texas was also called The Rusk Academy or just Rusk College. There were several of the pastors of the Douglass Baptist Church who were students of this school.

It was organized January 24, 1894. The first school was held September 2, 1895. The number of teachers was seven and the number of pupils was 142. They had a three-story brick building. The value of their property was \$23,000. The school was co-educational. It was closed and merged with the College of Marshall to become East Texas Baptist College.

This picture of Mrs. Kitty King was made in the Church yard in 1947 at Bobby's Baccalaureate service.



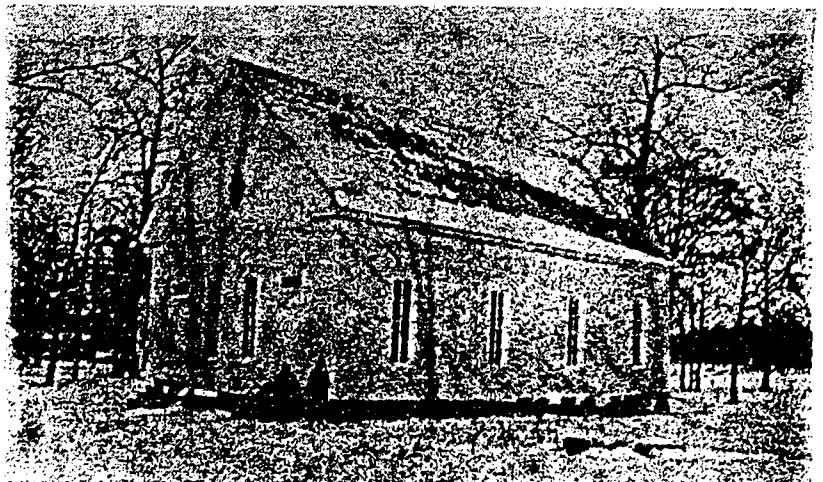
In interviewing Mrs. Ada Paine Acrey, I secured the following information. She was born on the Mim Bates farm near Nat, Texas May 6, 1873. She is now ninety-six and lives with her daughter, Mrs. J.A. Briggs in Alto, Texas. When she was a baby her father and some other men wanted to go West to get rich. On the other side of Dallas they ran into an Indian uprising and turned back. Her father bought a shawl to keep her warm from the only dry goods store in Dallas, Sanger Brothers. She said her mother told her black mud was knee deep to a mule on Elm Street.

Miss Ada Paine grew up on Flower Mountain outside Nat. When she was fifteen, she went to Nacogdoches to go to school. A Mr. Colman brought the school from Louisiana. She got her Certificate when she was sixteen. She first taught school on Flower Mountain, then a year in a school about two miles outside Douglass. The last school she held was at Old Eden when she was nineteen.

She married Abner Donald Acrey. His initials spelled her first name so they made a good couple. His uncle was "Si" Sile Acrey who pastored the Baptist Church in 1890. Bro. George W.C. Self performed the ceremony. Although her father was Presbyterian, he was the one who met the new Baptist pastor, Bro. W.M. Gaddy, at the train depot in Alto, in 1883. He brought the new preacher to Douglass by buggy. When the Presbyterians thinned out, her family joined the Methodist. She said the Baptist were more numerous than the other two. Everyone worked together, and there was no thought of denominational differences.

There are not many photographs of the Old Union Church left. When the Church and school was moved from the cemetery to where the school is now, it was first made of logs. This building was not used long until they built the Union building that stood till 1946.

The Old Union Church was torn down in 1946. The Methodist Church was built in 1947-48. It is named in memory of Mrs. Beatrice Campbell Watkins. One and a half acres was purchased from Mrs. Belle King. The pastor then was Rev. Bobby Watters.

The Original church and school in Douglass was a Union Church where the Presbyterians, Methodist, and Baptist shared the building. It was located on the hill where the cemetery is now. It faced the Old San Antonio Road. Later a box structure was built where the present school is located. It had a dome shaped ceiling with four windows on each side and two doors at the front. Each preacher preached one Sunday a month. The church only had one treasury. They jointly owned the building and the furniture.

The story is that the first person buried in the cemetery was a little girl killed by Indians. There is a rock in the cemetery with the date 1836 carved on it. The land had belonged to Dr. Coon. The slaves were buried in the North corner of the cemetery.

In May of 1908 a new record book was started for the Douglass Baptist Church. The old books were lost by a fire. A copy of the rules of the Church were drawn up which was already in effect. A Confession of Faith after the order of the original "Philadelphia Confession of Faith" was written out, and the standard Baptist Church Covenant put in the records. This is a copy of the rules of conduct that the Church adopted:

RULES OF DECORUM

We the Missionary Baptist Church of at Douglass duly organized do hereby adopt the following rules of decorum.

1st. The Church shall meet not less than once each month.

2nd. The Church shall commune once each season.

3rd. The Church shall be governed by the majority and if any of the members of the church are found guilty of the following offenses they shall be amemdable to the church, Via Breaking the Sabbath, lying, stealing, Gambling, Drinking, Selling or Bartering intoxicating liquors, Fornication, Adultry, Reveling of any kind, or anything that is contrary to the teaching of the Bible, if they fail or refuse to Make amends to the church, shall be excluded.

The following are selections from the old record books of the First Baptist Church of Douglass.

"July, 1908 Protracted meeting began Saturday night before the 1st. Sunday in July. The following Friday night opportunity for church membership was extended. Bro. Tom King joined Verline and Winnie King presented themselves on confession of faith Viz. Mr. Luther Kelley, Mr. Tatum, Mr. Joe Greene, L.S. King, and Lola King, and also W.L. Harrison joined by letter. Collection for Bro. Mc Lendon, \$13.55. N.C. Partin Mod. Nora King C.C."

Mrs. Nora King was a school teacher, and a very faithful worker over the years in the Douglass Baptist Church. She was married to a Presbyterian Minister, Rev. Norvell. They had one son, Robert Norvell. Rev. Norvell died, and she then later married Turner King. She served as Church Clerk for over fifteen years.

On September 6, 1908 Bro. W.L. Harrison was appointed as the representative to the Baptist Association at Trinity, Texas. On October 26, Bro. G.M. Hale was also elected as a representative. George M. Hale was the founder of the "Normal School for Teachers" in Douglass. This school was here over two years. They offered the first, second, and third Teachers certificates. Miss Tessie Campbell and Miss Kitty Coon attended this school. There were students from all over the state here for the school.

On January 3, 1909, Bro. N.C. Partin resigned as County Missionary and came to Douglass as their pastor. He had been their preacher one Sunday in each month. After the meeting with Bro. Mc Lendon, Bro. Partin resigned in July, 1909. In September of the same year, County Missionary Bro. A.L. Charlton preached for the Church. The Association met at Sacul Church the 4th Sunday in October.

"March 25, 1911 Sunday March 26 Church met for preaching. The Church not having had any pastor since Bro. Partin resigned July 1909. We had no preaching only by the Missionary a few times. The last time being Sept. 1909. Hence after preaching Sunday by Bro. L.D. White (who chance to drop in) con. was called. The priveleges of the church extended Bro. W.H. Jackson and his little daughter Mimmie presented themselves for membership by letter and Elmer Moore and Emma Jackson on confession and as candidates for baptism.

Bro. White was invited to preach for us again. The next fourth Sunday and it suggested that at that time we would call a preacher. Con. did not adjourn till the 3rd Sunday in Apr. after preaching by Bro. W.H. Jackson, Resuming business With Bro. Jackson as Mod Pro tern. Sister Della Jackson presented herself for Membership by letter. The calling of the pastor was deferred till the fourth Sun. also to baptize the candidates if ready. Sister Nettie Bruton was granted a church letter as her own request. Con. adjourned in order."

Bro. W.H. Jackson was Mod. Protem. of that meeting in 1911, and Mrs. Nora King was the Church Clerk.

April 22, 1911, Bro. L.D. White was called as the pastor of the Church. Bro. White was then a student at the Baptist Rusk Academy in Rusk, Texas. No set amount was stated as to his pay. In July a protracted meeting was begun with Bro. Wester preaching. Three men had to be disciplined by the church for misdemeanors. One came and made acknowledgments and was forgiven, and one had to be turned out. There were nine additions to the church. The meeting lasted ten days. There was \$15.85 given to the evangelist and \$6.50 given to the pastor. Mrs. Kitty King said that one time in these years that Bro. White was in such a financial need that not only his shoes had holes in them, but the socks also were worn through. He took shoe polish and put on the bottoms of his feet so the holes would not show. She said he was one of the sweetest, most dedicated pastors the Church has had.

On November 23, 1911, Bro. Archie Lawler filled Bro. Whites appointment because he could not come. Bro. Lawler received \$1.70 for his services. These men would take a train to Cushing, Texas and then ride the mail wagon to Douglass. Mrs. Kitty would keep the young preachers in her home. Her eldest son graduated from the school in Rusk and then went on to Baylor. Once at the table when a large group had come from the school to sing for the Church, Mrs. Kitty turned to one of the young men and ask how he was classified, he told her he was the president. The Rusk College later merged with the Marshall College and is now known as East Texas Baptist College.

In September of 1913, Bro. G.E. Hammonds was called as the pastor. He worked as a clerk for B.K. King and Son General Merchandise and Hardware Store here in Douglass.

On November 28, 1915, Bro. J.E. Adkinson was called as the pastor of the Douglass Church. Bros. J.F. Cosper and W.C. Ferguson were elected as deacons in December, 1915. They were ordained on January 22, 1916. The Ordination Council were Brethren Adkinson, Ware (Then Dean of the Rusk Academy), Hammonds, and deacon Jack Christie. Back in August of 1912, there had been a ten day meeting with Bro. C.D. Owen preaching. There were 28 additions and Bro. Jack Christie had been received as a deacon from the Eden Church. The Church Clerks notes say, "The Meeting closed at the water Wednesday".

In October of 1916, Bro. J.E. Adkinson resigned and Bro. E.M. Gentry was called as pastor. Bro. Gentry was also a student at the Rusk Academy. In March of 1917, the Church was host to Professor Cook who was the President of Rusk Academy. He made a talk on the importance of Christian Education. A protracted

meeting began in September with Bro. K.A. Woods doing the preaching. There were twenty-two accessions, one by letter and nineteen by baptism. On August 31, 1919, the Douglass Baptist Church met to discuss building a church building, and it was decided to build after the J.M.P. Morrow meeting. These plans were never carried out, and the Baptist continued to meet in the Union building.

"Oct. 15th 1920 Douglass Baptist Church opened their Summer revival of which E.M. Gentry is Pastor, Sept. 1st 1920 running 12 days, of which V.B. Starnes was evangelist, with Bro. Bentford Singer, Also Miss Allgood was pianist.

The Meeting was one of the best that was ever held in Douglass at anytime before, and having had 40 additions to the Church. Bro. Gentry Mod R.W. King"

This revival meeting is the only tent revival ever held in Douglass. The records that are available jump then to 1925.

"Douglass Baptist Church of Christ - Douglass, Texas 9/13/25 Bro. J.W. Mc Call was called as pastor. He was to give two sermons each month. Their was a Revival begining Sept. 6/25 Bro. A.T. Gerrard preaching. 9 for Baptism 1 by statement. Bro. Gerrard was paid \$58.85. John Grimes C.C."

On September the 18th 1927, Bro. A.T. Garrard was called as the pastor. In July of 1928, Bro. J.B. Oliver held a revival in which there were fourteen added to the Church. In July of 1929 Bro. Oliver again held a meeting, along with a Miss Burr who did personal work among the young people, there were twenty-five additions in that meeting. Bro. Oliver had lived in Douglass and attended G.H. Hale's school, The Normal School for Teachers.

Bro. H.F. Sanders was called as pastor October 5, 1930. The membership of the Church was 183 at this time. Bro. E.M. Gentry conducted a revival in July. In July of 1932, Bro. R.E. Bass of Tenaha preached a meeting. Bro. Joe Baldwin Jr. led the singing. There were twenty-four additions. The revival that was held in July, 1933, was preached by Bro. Hulon Coffman. This meeting lasted eight days and there were twenty-one additions. In August of 1933, Bro. Bud Arrant preached a meeting which lasted thirteen days. There were thirty-seven additions in that revival. Membership was now 238. Mrs. J.N. Craft was the Church Clerk. In 1934 Rev. J.B. Oliver of Beaumont again preached a meeting resulting in twenty-seven additions to the Church. There are 262 members now.

In September of 1934 Rev. Weldon Sanders, the son of Rev. H.F. Sanders was called as the pastor. Mrs. O.S. Ryan was elected as Church Clerk. In October 1934, the Church voted to have preaching the 1st and 3rd Sundays. The pastor's

salary was to be by collection each Sunday night. In July 1935, Bro. Oliver was again ask to be the preacher for the revival. His wife and Bro. Weldon Sanders were in charge of the music. There were eight additions. The offering for Bro. Oliver was \$51.25. On July the 29th the Church decided to build a new church building. Which is the present auditorium. Two acres was secured from Bob King. One acre the Church bought, and Mr. Bob gave one acre. Charlie Grimes, Bob King, Mrs. E.J. Rector, the Texas Co., and others donated the trees, and the Bobo Mill cut and hauled the lumber to build the church building.

In September 1940, Bro. Higginbotham was the pastor. Mrs. J.B. Talley moved to buy a communion set with five dozen glasses, seconded by Mrs. O.S. Ryan. Bro. J.M. Talley was the Chairman of the Deacons for several years. Their home was the Dr. George Perry Campbell home.

On October 9, 1940, the plans were drawn up for an addition of Sunday School rooms. The building committee was: Mr. Craft, Mr. Ferguson, and Mr. Ryan: Mr. Marshall was chairman of the finance committee.

December 18, 1940, Rev. J.E. Johnson was called as pastor of the Church. His salary was to be \$35.00 per month. In September, 1941, the Church voted to have their conference the first Wednesday night in each month.

September 19, 1943, the officers of the Church were: P.M. Farmer, Sunday School Super.; Mr. Craft, the Assistant; Mrs. O.S. Ryan, Church Clerk; Mr. Earl Coon, Tres.; Miss Vera Wilson, Sunday School Secretary; Mrs. W.E. Talley, pianist; Mrs. Verline Wisener, Chorister; Mrs. Lillie Byrd Assistant; Delegates: Mr. O.S. Ryan, W.C. Ferguson, Mr. J.B. Talley, Mr. Earl Coon, and Mrs. Verline Wisener. Mr. E.H. Croft was the Chairman of the Deacons.

After Bro. J.E. Johnson resigned as pastor it was decided to call a pastor full time at \$125.00 per month. On October 3, 1943, Bro. L.A. Willingham was called as pastor. August 27, 1944, four deacons were set apart, they were: C.F. Sanders, S.B. Young, L.E. Moser, and Hayden Knighton. These were ordained October 8, 1944. Bros. Willingham, Spalding, Hallis, Lamb, and W. Sanders were the examining body. Bro. C.F. Sanders is another son of Rev. H.F. Sanders. Bro. Willingham left the church in November of 1944.

Bro. S.O. Bonner, was called to be the pastor January 7, 1945. His salary was to be \$150.00 per month. The parsonage was fixed with modern conveniences. The main part of the church was built at the end of 1936 and the first of 1937. The parsonage was built at the end of 1938 and the first of 1939. On January 27, 1946, the Church voted to add six rooms on the East end at a cost of \$800.00. Bro. Bonner left the Church on December 23, 1945.
